KEYNOTE speaker

we are pleased to welcome

Evan Bowness PhD Candidate, UBC

Evan is a PhD Candidate at UBC's Institute for Resources, Environment and Sustainability and the Centre for Sustainable Food Systems at the University of British Columbia, and he also teaches at the University of Manitoba's Department of Sociology. He is grateful for the invitation to speak with you as an uninvited guest on the territories of the Coast Salish peoples.

Evan is an urban political ecologist and visual sociologist. His dissertation explores how urban food politics are embedded in social struggles for land — both in the city and the country.

This talk is part of Evan's broader research on food sovereignty in urban places, which features

interviews with urban agrarians in Metro Vancouver. Evan will share some findings from his research about urban agriculture and land struggles, and discuss opportunities within the urban farming community to support social mobilization for food systems change and creating a more equitable world.

Many of us in attendance at the Urban Farming Forum are what Evan calls 'urban agrarians' – city folk who care about foodlands and food providers. As urban agrarians, we are concerned about the health of the land that provides us with nourishment. We also share a concern for the people who steward that land—the food providers who cultivate and harvest our food. Evan's argument (drawn from a paper he wrote with Dr. Hannah Wittman at UBC) is that people who live in cities have a responsibility to foodlands and to exercise solidarity with food providers, especially those who experience problems that can be hard for city folk to see. He will start by provoking some collective thoughts about

what responsibility and solidarity mean for urban agrarians. We will also consider how not everyone has equal responsibilities, owing to the fact that some people are more privileged than others. We will identify our responsibilities and privileges, as well as opportunities (both in the city and beyond) for contributing to a sustainable and just food system. And we'll talk about the different ways in which urban agriculture can provide a source of urban agrarianism and space for social justice.

SESSION A presentation

Description

In 2016, the City of Vancouver adopted Urban Farming Guidelines to legitimize urban farming as a permitted land use activity and licensable business type in residential, industrial, commercial, and historic area zones. Council directed staff to collaborate with stakeholders on reviewing the policy after a pilot period and to report back to Council on its effectiveness. Caitlin Dorward, Social Planner from the City of Vancouver, will provide an interim update on this review currently underway, including a summary of feedback heard thus far, issues under consideration, and opportunities to provide further input.

Caitlin Dorward Social Planner, City of Vancouver

Caitlin is a Social Planner at the City of Vancouver working in the areas of food policy and childcare planning. Prior to this, she served two terms as a member and co-chair of the Vancouver Food Policy Council. She worked previously a Planner at the Provincial Agricultural Land Commission and as Senior Research Associate at KPU's Institute for Sustainable Food Systems. Caitlin is a graduate of UBC's Faculty of Land and Food Systems.



SESSION B dialogue

Description

"Unacknowledged white privilege gives the lie to the food movement's rhetoric of justice, good intentions, and sustainability." - Rachel Slocum

Food movements across so-called BC and beyond are beginning to get past the awkward dance we typically do around naming and addressing race, power, privilege, and oppression in our work. The understanding that food systems and efforts to create change within them are still benefiting and governed by those with racial and other forms of privilege is growing.

Coming to terms with these realities can be a vulnerable, uncomfortable, and confusing process for people with white and lightskinned privilege who, while likely holding strong social justice values, are confronted with the role their privilege unintentionally plays in reinforcing the marginalization of others.

Recognizing this emerging dynamic in our movement, just over a year ago the hua foundation, in partnership with the Vancouver and Kamloops Food Policy Councils, hosted the inaugural "Unpacking White Privilege in the Food Movement" series. Over 1.5 days, a supportive learning space was held for those with white and light-skinned privilege working in food systems and movements in Vancouver and Kamloops. The workshops were a starting place in unpacking how our racial privilege shows up in our work and explore what being a white anti-racist means in a food systems and movement context.

This session at the forum is not a workshop on these topics, but rather, a conversation hosted by some of the folks participating in the Unpacking White Privilege in the Food Movement project. Attendees will be invited to be facilitated and engage in the conversation with us. The conversation is open to anyone with a focus on white privilege and antiracism in food systems and movement work.

SESSION C presentation

Description

How can cities meet their sustainability goals while supporting the growth of a vibrant urban farming sector? This session presents preliminary findings of the Vancouver Urban Farming Census and how the urban farming sector has changed since the last census in 2016. We will highlight specific examples of how other cities use policy to support urban farming, and discuss recommendations for how the City of Vancouver can use policy to advance, rather than hinder, the growth of the urban farming sector.
